The Program Committee hopes everyone has a Happy New Year and has resolved to learn new tip and techniques.

With that in mind, please consider signing up for the next workshop, happening in March.

Saturday, March 11, 2023, 9 - 3:30 Elizabeth DeCroos: POJAGI (Korean Stained Glass) Spring Flower Window Panel \$40 (On Zoom) Pojagi is the name for an ancient Korean form of stitching that often includes reversible patchwork. If you've ever held a flimsy (quilt top without backing or batting) up to a window, you've probably noticed that it looks like stained glass. But if you've ever tried it, you know there is one problem – raw edges.

Elizabeth of Epida Studio has adapted the traditional techniques for our modern sewing machines and batik fabrics and solves that raw-edge problem with her modern Pojagi seam. She will lead us in this workshop to make

window hangings that give the appearance of stained glass and are fully reversible. When students hold up their first piece to a window, the most common reaction is "Wow!" Suitable for all levels.

The theme is 'Celebrating Local Sites and Scenes'. We hope this will be good advertising to the general public that comes through the show and inspires them to explore places they may not know about or reminds them of sites they want to revisit.

The piece may be a realistic applique version or could be a modernistic, stylized version that implies a site, as long as the title makes reference to the locale.

Someone asked at the November meeting if people could make more than one piece. The answer is yes, although one person will not be eligible to win more than one ribbon.

Quilt Bee January 28, 2023


During the January Meeting there is still time to sign up, as a team or individually. Kits, batting and backing will be available at the meeting and the Bee. At this time Haven is full for quilts. Not sure how many they will have left after the holiday season. We have around 80 quilts in the storage locker. I still encourage everyone to make quilts. Haven has also requested tote bags for families, as an ongoing project for when they leave Haven House to carry groceries and personal items. They would like large, quilted, beach bag size bags (20 " wide by 18" deep, with 3 inch box corners and long strap handles). I made two kinds as samples (see below left), one with plain batting and lined and one with firm foam batting, also lined. Either is good. Also, remember with this event to bring your own lunch, we will have the coffee and tea. The Pearls satellite group will be there to sew on labels and binding if you need. Placemats

Thanks to everyone for submitting the 81 placemats and 11 tea cozies turned in at the November meeting. These were absolutely essential for our Christmas giving. The Nanaimo Meals on Wheels have almost doubled with respect to the population they serve, so instead of the usual 60 placemats, this year they needed 113! We also gave 18 to the Meals on Wheels on Gabriola Island, and 7 to the Meals on Wheels in Ladysmith. The Salvation Army received 120 placemats and 60 tea cozies. They were all very appreciative of this donation. The volunteer who coordinates the Meals on Wheels for Nanaimo told me that their clients were thrilled.

I have counted the remaining stock and we have 10 placemats and 16 tea cozies left. This means we will need quite a few donated before June so we have enough for the Quilt Show Tea Room. Calling for Depot Captain Volunteers!

What duties does a Depot Captain perform?

Collect exhibitors' quilts – at your convenience, at your home, a few days before the show. Deliver these quilts on the morning of Thursday, June 8 between 9:00 and 9:30 AM to the "Quilt Hanging" team at the curling rink.

****NOTE: NON-SMOKING ENVIRONMENT ONLY****

On Sunday June 11, receive the same quilts from the "Take Down" committee and redistribute them to their rightful owners. The following is an overview of how many Depot Captains are required and in which areas:

Quilt Show 2023 Depot Captain Designated Areas:

- Duncan/North Cowichan/Crofton one captain needed
- 2. Ladysmith/Saltair/Chemainus four (Judy Pederson + 3)
- 3. Moose Hall/South: incl. Cedar, Chase River, Yellowpoint, Cinnibar Valley and Extension area, South Wellington and Cassidy – one
- South Nanaimo: Moose Hall (south end of Tenth St.) north of Jinglepot Rd/Westwood Lake, Downtown and Harewood – two
- Central Nanaimo: north of Fifth St. turnoff on the Parkway and north of Comox Rd to Mostar/ Rutherford – five
- North Nanaimo: north of Mostar/Rutherford Rd to Aulds Rd and south of Dickinson Rd – fiveHammond Bay Road Area – one
- 7. Lantzville one
- 8. Parksville one
- 9. Gabriola Island one

2023 Quilt Show Ballot Committee

At the September 2022 in-person guild meetings, guild members voted for their category preferences for the upcoming 2023 Show, and the results were posted in the October 2022 newsletter. Below are the definitions and categories with their descriptions. Please review these carefully before you fill in your Calls To Entry. This show has a more technique-focused approach. Note the Small Traditional Quilt – smaller than a single bed size using traditional block designs. Examine the other categories to determine whether your entry fits here or in one of those. Take your time and enjoy the process.

DEFINITIONS

SOLO: Quilt made and quilted by one person.

DUO: Quilt made and/or quilted by two people.

CATEGORIES

Large Traditional Quilt: Single bed size or larger. Uses traditional block designs.

Small Traditional Quilt: Pieces smaller than a single bed size. Uses traditional block designs.

Modern Quilt: Modern quilts are primarily functional and inspired by Modern design. Several characteristics may include the use of bold colours and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid colour, improvisational piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work.

Applique Quilt: May be hand or machine appliqued, with more than 50% of the blocks containing applique.

Special Event Quilt: Any quilt intended to celebrate a holiday, Hanukkah, Halloween, Christmas or family celebration or to celebrate a family history or an important event.

Quilt for a Child: Any quilt or wall hanging intended for a child.

Machine Paper-Pieced Quilt: Refers to sewing fabrics by machine onto a foundation to stabilize the quilt block due to unusual geometric shapes, small pieces or odd angles on a bias.

Hand-work: Any piece containing significant amount of hand-piecing, hand-embroidery, hand-applique or hand quilting.

Art Quilt: (Art Quilts may also be called Original Works). These are your own design, not derived or adapted from any existing pattern.

Accessories: Includes jackets, bags, table runners, placemats, etc.

Block of the Month




This block finishes at 14 inches square.

Cut four 5" white squares. Cut three 2" white strips and three 2" print strips (any colour).

Sew two print strips on either side of white strip (should be at least 20" long). Sew two white strips on either side of print strip (should be at least 10" long).

Cut these sewn strips into 2" slices as shown. Sew together to make five nine patches. Trim to 5" square. Sew the five 9 patches to the four white squares as shown below to make the large nine patch. Trim to 14". Stephanie Gislason
