Proposal to Raise Membership Fees

Following a review of Vancouver Island and Lower Mainland quilt guilds and after a few years of reduced and/or frozen membership fees, the guild executive will propose a fee increase at the February meeting for your consideration and a vote. While the membership fee itself does not form part of the by-laws, changes to membership fees do need to be brought before the membership for a vote at a general meeting. The motion is being considered in February because it is our practice to begin membership renewals for the coming year in the Spring before the current year ends.

The proposal will be to move the annual fee from \$30 to \$40 for the 2023/2024 guild year. For clarity, this is the guild year that starts September 1, 2023.

The executive understands that this is a big jump in one year, and it comes at a time of high inflation in most other parts of our lives. Like everything the guild's operating costs have been increasing, and our membership fees are currently lower than all other guilds reviewed. The rates charged by other guilds ranged from \$35 to \$60 per year, with \$50 being the most common. There is one guild at the \$35 rate – Campbell River. Our proposed increase equates to \$1/month for the active months of the guild year.

We look forward to the discussion and thank you for supporting the guild.



2023 Quilt Show Ballot Committee

Guild members who have never submitted a quilt before to a NQG show may submit a <u>FIRST TIME ENTRY</u>. On your Call To Entry form for each of your entries you must prioritize them as 1, 2, 3, etc. Each such member will have their name and first choice entered once only for the draw. The winner will receive a purple ribbon for her #1 entry. See **Rules to Play By** on page 13.

At the January Guild meeting, Val Ansell explained our new online Call To Entry submission process. All of this information can be found in the Members Only section of our website, under Quilt Show Information.

Below are the definitions and categories with their descriptions. Please review these carefully before you fill in your Call To Entries.

DEFINITIONS

SOLO: Quilt made and quilted by one person. **DUO:** Quilt made and/or quilted by two people.

CATEGORIES

Large Traditional Quilt: Single bed size or larger. Uses traditional block designs.

Small Traditional Quilt: Pieces smaller than a single bed size. Uses traditional block designs.

Modern Quilt: Modern quilts are primarily functional and inspired by Modern design. Several characteristics may include the use of bold colours and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid colour, improvisational piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work.

Applique Quilt: May be hand or machine appliqued, with more than 50% of the blocks containing applique.

Special Event Quilt: Any quilt intended to celebrate a holiday, Hanukkah, Halloween, Christmas or family celebration or to celebrate a family history or an important event.

Quilt for a Child: Any quilt or wall hanging intended for a child.

Machine Paper-Pieced Quilt: Refers to sewing fabrics by machine onto a foundation to stabilize the quilt block due to unusual geometric shapes, small pieces or odd angles on a bias.

Hand-work: Any piece containing significant amount of hand-piecing, hand-embroidery, hand-applique or hand quilting.

Art Quilt: (Art Quilts may also be called Original Works). These are your own design, not derived or adapted from any existing pattern.

Accessories: Includes jackets, bags, table runners, placemats, etc.




Block of the Month by Stephanie Gislason

Cut:

Colour 1 - Light- 1 strip 3 ½ X 26 inches Colour 2 - Dark – 1 strip 3 ½ X 26 inches Tan background – 2 strips 3 ½ X 28 inches

First, cut your Colour 1 and Color 2 3-1/2" x 26 strips into four 6-1/2" x 3-1/2" rectangles of each color.




Then cut your Colour 3 3-1/2" x 28" strips into eight 3-1/2" squares each.






For EACH of the Colour 1 and Colour 2 rectangles place a Colour 3 square, right sides together aligned on top of one end. Mark the diagonal on the wrong side and SEW on that line. Cut off the excess and press seam allowances towards triangle, then sew another square on the opposite end in the same manner. You will need four of these of each colour!



To piece the block, sew two of these new rectangle units together, as shown. Make four of these units and then piece them, first as rows, and then sew the two rows together to make your block. Trim to 12.5".

NANAIMO QUILTERS' GUILD SHOW 2023

Some Rules to Play By: To avoid problems, please read these before filling out your first form.

- 1. You must be a member in good standing of the Guild as of December 31, 2022.
- 2. Projects shown in any previous Nanaimo Quilt Show are <u>not</u> eligible. Quilts displayed in any other show are eligible.
- 3. The *quilt* need not be finished before *form* is submitted.
- 4. Use one entry form for **each** item. Please prioritize your projects using the designated line on each page. Ten pieces will be allowed per member.
- 5. This year we have created an **on-line** entry form. To reduce your work and ours, please use the on-line form if possible. For 2nd and higher entries, the form automatically enters your contact information. This link will be on the members-only section of the website and will be sent to the members as an e-cast. The form is submitted by pressing DONE at the end.
- 6. **Paper forms** will be available to members with no computer access. The paper "Call to Entry" form will be in the February Newsletter, or is available from the website. In order to enter via the Paper form, you must complete all **3** pages of the form. Put your story on the back of the 1st page, (for the Call to Entry Committee). Put a coloured photo or sketch of your entry on the 2nd page, in the space provided, (for the Hanging Committee). The 3rd page will be your receipt from the Depot Captains. The paper forms will be collected at the Show Table at each regular meeting from January 2023 to March 2023.
- 7. Both the On-line and Paper Call to Entry forms are due no later than March 22, 2023.
- 8. Your project must adhere to the size you indicate on the form. The Hanging Committee will organize the layout of the Quilt Show based on the information you submit. If you find the size of the finished item is larger or smaller than stated on the form, please inform the Call to Entry Committee at thornasite@gmail.com or call Val at 250 758 1185.
- 9. Each piece must have, on the back, both a 3" wide hanging sleeve attached across the entire width of the top and an identifying label with both the quilt's name and your name.
- 10. Finished quilts must be delivered to the Depot Captains by June 4th. Your Depot Captain will contact you approximately 2 weeks before the Show to arrange a drop-off time.
- 11. Pick up will be 1:30 2:30 Sunday June 11, 2023. No provision will be made for early pick-up. There will be no access to the show floor after 12:30 on June 11th. If you are unable to pick up your pieces, please inform your Depot Captain of the name and phone number of your delegate. In order to claim your pieces, you or your delegate must present the receipt(s) you received from your Depot Captain. Make sure your delegate has all of your receipts.
- 12. This year we will repeat the category, 'First Time Entry', for those who have never entered a quilt in a Nanaimo Quilt Show. Each eligible entrant will receive a participation ribbon. A prize will be awarded to the winner who will be selected by a random draw.
- 13. Insurance The Nanaimo Quilt Guild cannot be held responsible for loss or damage to your piece. Please ensure your quilt is covered by your homeowner's insurance.
