From the President's Pen

Welcome to March everyone! I hope it's safe to say that winter is behind us and we can all look forward to the longer, warmer days of Spring. Weren't we lucky with our last Guild meeting to just miss a rather large snowfall. It looked beautiful on the trees but it was a day to stay home and let others tackle the roads!

For those who were not at the last meeting, I want to let you know that we have rented a tour bus to take us from Beban Park to the Quilt Canada Show at the Vancouver Convention Centre and back to Beban Park at day's end. The date we will be going is Thursday, May 31, the most popular day by choice so far. We will meet the bus about 7:30 in the morning and the return time will be determined soon. So far, we have 21 people signed up for this day and it will be first come first served, so let me know if you would like to go and I will add you to our growing list. The bus holds 47 passengers and our travel cost will be about \$72 per person, less for seniors who will get a discount on the ferry trip.

Looking on the website, I see that tour buses are encouraged to have tickets beforehand, and also that we will get a 10% entry fee reduction for buying more than 30 tickets. So the plan will be to add the ticket price to your bus fare. I will let you know what that is when I know for sure. Once we have enough people I will buy the tickets and we will be in business.

Another item of business I wanted to mention is a second gift we will be giving at the May evening meeting. I was given a Go! Fabric Cutter with two dies for Guild use. We have decided to hold a draw for this item and it will be given at the May meeting. It is too difficult to keep these things as a Guild, with limited space available and the need for someone to then be the 'keeper' of the item. We hope the winner of this item will use it for some charity quilts as well as her own work, but of course that will be up to her!

Vicki, as you know, is offering a full size quilt kit with all patterns and fabric needed to complete the top. It is a lovely quilt in rich jewel tones for someone who loves those colours. As with the fabric cutter, we will offer a chance to win to anyone attending the May meeting who wishes to enter the draw for this item.

I hope you all enjoyed Cindy's photo to fabric transfer program at our last meeting. This is something I haven't tried yet but I think there will be times coming in my life when I am going to want to use this technique on some heirloom quilts for my children.

I am writing this President's Pen on what I am going to assume is our last day of snow this winter. When I looked out my window this morning I was struck by the beauty of it, covering everything so perfectly and hanging heavy on the trees and shrubs. The silence that comes with a heavy snow is always a welcome and serene experience for me. 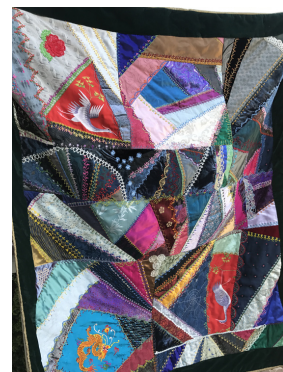

March 24: Crazy Quilt Techniques - Sue Artuso

Many of you already know Sue as a member of our Guild. She started sewing and quilting at a very young age. Her grandmother and great aunts would get together every summer and put a quilt on the frame under a big tree and quilt every day for weeks at a time, until each one had a completed quilt. Sue would be under the frame sorting scraps, and threading needles. It follows that scrap quilting is her favourite. This lends itself well for crazy quilting, which adds embroidery stitches to her scrap quilting. She enjoys the traditional quilts best, but has tried many styles and types.

"Crazy quilting" refers to the textile art of crazy patchwork and is sometimes used



interchangeably with that term. Crazy quilting does not actually refer to a specific kind of quilting, but a specific kind of patchwork lacking repeating motifs and with the seams and patches heavily embellished. Because the careful geometric design of quilt blocks is less important in crazy quilts, quilters are able to use smaller and more irregularly shaped pieces of fabric. Crazy quilts are far more likely to use exotic pieces of fabric (velvet, satin, tulle, silk, and embellishments (buttons, lace, ribbons, beads, embroidery)).

Crazy quilting as a textile art is extremely creative and free-flowing by nature, and crazy quilters often learn as much about embellishments as about crazy quilting itself. *(from Wikipedia)*

Sue will teach you several techniques of crazy quilting needed to put a block together at class so you can leave and make many more on your own. Skill level: beginner to advanced

April 14: A Splash of Colour with Coreen Zerr

Presenter: Coreen is a fibre artist living in Nanaimo, BC, who utilizes fabric and thread to create art in a way that captures the elements of texture, colour and line that fibre can achieve. She wants her work to show what can be created with these elements and to educate others. The tactile feel of this art is exhilarating and rewarding. Coreen creates realistic art,

often using the beautiful scenery and nature of the world around her.

Workshop: Learn to create your own fabric just for fun or for a specific project. Using a variety of techniques and tools, Coreen will introduce you to the art of painting fabric. Skill Level: Beginner to Advanced

Presenter: Art - in some form or other - has always been a part of Ionne's life. Since she was a child, she sketched and painted right along with her sewing - making clothes for herself. Then, during a six-year visit to Australia, she became interested in

Also included were: the Guild membership list and a list of member names interested in meeting to quilt outside of the Guild. It also contained a suggestion section, one could fill out the form and put it in the suggestion box at the meeting. Members who didn't attend the meeting had their newsletters mailed to them. This changed a few months later when members preferred to receive their newsletter before the meetings. A decision was made to mail everyone a newsletter prior to each meeting.

By 1986, the format of the newsletter changed as printing costs took its toll on the Guild's limited budget. The newsletter became a double sided single sheet of paper 8-1/2" by 14" folded in half. Information was condensed with only the highlights of the previous meeting, program information, upcoming events and brief committee reports.

In 1990, the Executive passed a motion that allowed the newsletter to expand as they wanted to see a list of committees, more helpful hints, birthday greetings, and more puzzles or patterns to be included as space permitted. In 1991, the format changed and more pages were added, but in 1992 the newsletter went back to the previous folded format due to printing costs.

In 1992, the Guild was contacted by a company in Alberta that specialized in hand-dyed cotton wanting to advertise, on a regular basis, in the newsletter. Instead of money, payment was made in fabrics that were used as a door, raffle and quilt show prizes. In 1993, a motion was passed that the newsletter

would start accepting advertising to subsidize its' cost, but it wasn't until 1996 when other companies and Guild shops began to place ads in the newsletter.

Up to now the newsletters were printed monthly except for December, July and August. When the Guild expanded into both afternoon and evening meetings the newsletter added more pages and in December 1999, began printing a December newsletter.

In 2001, the newsletter was available online on the Guild's website. Those who had access to computers were encouraged to read or print their own copies of the newsletter to help cut down on the Guild's printing and postage costs. In 2012, a motion was introduced to have those who needed a paper copy of the newsletter mailed to them should pay a fee to cover the increased cost of printing and postage. Although a motion had been passed in 1993 regarding the income of the advertising to be used to subsidize the costs of the newsletter, it was felt by the Executive that the advertising funds belong to the Guild as a whole and that others were not being similarly subsidized and in "fairness" the recipients of the paper copies should cover the rise in costs.

Today our newsletter is just as important as it was in the past in helping members stay in touch with each other. It is always full of information and to those who are new to the Guild, back issues are available to read on line.

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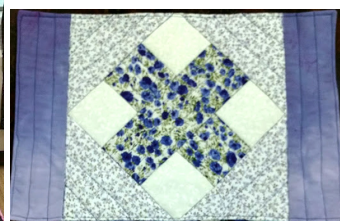
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Nanaimo Quilters' Guild General Meeting February 14, 2018

Moved by Barb Root to accept the minutes of the January 17, 2018 general meeting as published in the February newsletter. Seconded by Debbie Van Otterloo. Carried.

Treasurer's Report: Posted on the bulletin board.

Correspondence: Graham Gates thank you note for his gift given at the December Christmas Potluck meeting.

Announcements: Cherry Patten, a founding NQG member, passed away January 22. Norma Steven will record the minutes, since Val Ursulak is still experiencing sciatica. Arrangements are being made to charter a bus for the CQA Vancouver Show on Thursday, May 31. A sign-up sheet is available and ridership for the 47 seats will be on a first come basis.
