A fibre artist who explores innovative techniques in surface design and texture, her objective is to create fibre art that allows the viewer to relate in some meaningful way. Her work has been shown at Guild Shows. Trend-Tex Challenges (CQA). Fi-brations, Ladysmith Waterfront Gallery, solo shows at Satin Moon & Kaleidoscope Quilt Shops. Karen has written articles for The Canadian Quilter and Quilters' Connection Magazines and continues to promote quilting whenever possible.

If you saw this project in the Spring 2016 edition of Quilters' Connection Magazine and wanted recreate it – here is your opportunity. Using your own photograph, Karen will

- here is your opportunity. Using your own photograph, Karen will guide you through the process of creating your own memory vertical landscape. Piecing and raw edge appliqué techniques are used. Karen has chosen a monochromatic theme using blues and whites but you can make yours unique by selecting your favorite fabrics.

March 24: Crazy Quilt Techniques with Sue Artuso

Many of you already know Sue as a member of our Guild. She started sewing and quilting at a very young age. Her grandmother and great aunts would get together every summer and put a quilt on the frame under a big tree and quilt every day for weeks at a time, until each one had a completed quilt. Sue would be under the frame sorting scraps, and threading needles. It follows that scrap quilting is her favourite. This lends itself well for crazy quilting, which adds embroidery stitches to her scrap quilting. She enjoy the traditional quilts best, but has tried many styles and types.

"Crazy quilting" refers to the textile art of crazy patchwork and is sometimes used interchangeably with that term. Crazy quilting does not actually refer to a specific kind of quilting, but a specific kind of patchwork lacking repeating motifs and with the seams and patches heavily embellished. Because the

careful geometric design of quilt blocks is less important in crazy quilts, quilters are able to use smaller and more irregularly shaped pieces of fabric. Crazy quilts are far more likely to use exotic pieces of fabric (velvet, satin, tulle, silk, and embellishments (buttons, lace, ribbons, beads, embroidery). Crazy quilting as a textile art is extremely creative and free-flowing by nature, and crazy quilters often learn as much about embellishments as about



crazy quilting itself. (from Wikipedia)

Sue will teach you several techniques of crazy quilting needed to put a block together at class so you can leave and make many more on your own. Cost: \$40.00 Skill level: beginner to advanced

Coreen is a fibre artist living in Nanaimo, who utilizes fabric and thread to create art in a way that captures the elements of texture, colour and line that fibre can achieve. She wants her work to show what can be created with these elements and to educate others. The tactile feel of this art is exhilarating and rewarding. Coreen creates realistic art, often using the beautiful scenery and nature of the world around her.

Learn to create your own fabric just for fun or for a specific project. Using a variety of techniques and tools, Coreen will introduce you to the art of painting fabric. Skill Level: Beginner to Advanced



Job Description for Quilt Show Treasurer

Use a computer bookkeeping system and set up a Show Account.

Keep track of expenditures and income.

Receive all bills, receipts and file.

All expenses by committees are to be signed by the show convener.

Payment for venue rental as determined by venue contract.

At the time of the show, duties include:

Counting of monies and making deposits daily or as needed.

Provide floats for raffle, admission, sales table, lunch room and have change available for all.

Collect money every 2 hours during the busy periods.

Track all money for income source.

A room to be allotted for the treasurer only.

Create a final report for post-show committee meeting.

Admissions Job Description

Arrange for purchase of additional wristbands as needed.

Collaborate with Volunteer Coordinator for volunteers to man the admission table and work out shift schedule.

Duties of the admission table include:

Handing out of ballots for voting at the time of the show.

Hand out prize draw tickets and give to the prize table every ½ hour.

Make a sign for the table.




