Not to be outdone, IPad and IPhone users now have some choices for application downloads that can aid in expanding our "Passion of the Quilt".

Applications for the IPad seem to be favoured, as the size of the screen over the IPhone just makes more sense. BlockFab lets you choose from a great number of blocks and lets you calculate the vardage for the size of quilt that you wish to make--the Price is free! There is Vook-Quilting for Everyone that mixes pictures, text and video for \$3.99. This is available for both IPhone and IPad for the same price. There is also an application called Fabric U-Quilter's App. It is similar to the DVD ÈQ series but the price is only \$14.99. For IPhone users try Quilting 101 and Quilting Lessons. I am sure that daily we can look forward to more choices to further our craft. Don't forget Pod cast and Pod cast videos on Itunes. Bonnie McCaffrey has a new edition every month and sometimes every week where she interviews and showcases great Quilting teachers around the world. Unfinished Business

1. Bev Rogan, in Calgary, has connected with CRASH (Christian Relief Assistance Support and Hope) and Global Samaritan Resources to send and distribute quilts in Japan. She has organized a 40,000 cubic foot container, which will provide FREE shipping to Japan for quilts! Bev has a Facebook page **quiltsforjapan@groups.facebook.com** and a website **www.quiltsforjapan.ca** Quilts must be finished, any size up to and including 50" X 70", any design. They may be used, but must be clean and in good condition. Due to space limitations in the relief shelters in Japan, quilts should not exceed 60" x 70".

Labels: please include with your name, city and message or wishes of hope and comfort. The website for translating your label into Japanese is **www.lapelstick.com/quilts-for-japan**

Send your finished quilt(s), at your own expense, to either address. Please do **not** include the word "quilt" on labels on the outside of your shipment. Coralee will be leaving Houston on May 20, heading to Calgary for the deadline of May 24th to help pack the container. Quilts received by either Barb or Coralee after May 24th will be shipped as well.



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2. Naomi Ichikawa, Editor of Patchwork quilts Tsushin Magazin, has started distributing the quilts they have received so far, working with Unicef and the Clinical Psychologist Society, and will deliver quilts to the temporary housing for the victims, nurseries, schools and orphanages. She asks that when you ship the quilts to Japan, please write clearly the quantity and value of the quilts (please write between \$5 to \$10). Please indicate as **relief goods for the affected people of Tohoku Kanto Earthquake**. You can write bed linens instead of quilts for description of contents. Please email Naomi (see April newsletter) when you ship the quilt. Note: If shipping from Canada, check out Canadian Quilters web site for collection points. www.canadianquilter.com/news-events.php?ID=29

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Thanks to everyone who made the April blocks and congratulations to last month's winner, Janet Knecht. This month's block is a variation of Carolina Lily, coloured to represent the lovely colours of summer lilies. The construction is very simple. But remember, accuracy in cutting and piecing is important. All seams are $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Unfinished block is 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square.

Fabric Choices and Cutting:

Tone-on-tone or small scale floral prints would work well for this block. Use tone-on-tone white for the back-ground, Orange-Pink (**OP**) or medium pink for the points of the flower and Fuchsia (**F**) or a darker medium pink for the centre. Choose a medium green (**MG**) for the stem and light green (**LG**) for the two corners.

	2:	3 ½" x 3 ½"
Orange-Pink	3:	3 ⁷ / ₈ " x 3 ⁷ / ₈ "
Fuchsia	3:	3 ½" x 3 ½"
Med Green	1:	3 ⁷ / ₈ " x 3 ⁷ / ₈ "
	1:	3 ½" x 3 ½"
Lt Green:	2:	3 ½" x 3 ½"

June Block of the Month



Summer Lily

If you want to experiment with colour in this block, you could vary the placement of the fuchsia and orange-pink or choose lighter or darker shades of the two colour families. If you do vary the placement, be sure to adjust the sizes of the patches accordingly.

Construction:

First make eight half-square triangle units using the eight 3⁷/₈" squares. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the four white

3 ⁷/₈" squares. Place the white squares on top of the three orangepink and the one medium green 3⁷/₈" squares, right sides together. Sew a ¹/₄" seam on either side of the diagonal line. Cut on the diagonal lines to make the eight half-square triangle units. Press to dark. Lay out the block according to the sketch and assemble. Be sure to get the light green squares in opposite corners. Bring your squares to the June picnic.

The following descriptions for Executives and Committees are included in the new Handbook and all positions are open to volunteers from our membership each year.

THE EXECUTIVE:

An *elected* body, known as "the EXECUTIVE", governs the Guild. Executive Officers include: the President(s), First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer(s), Past President and four Standing Committees.

President(s): Coordinate(s) Guild activities, and presides at meetings. **First Vice-President:** Assists the President, perform duties in her absence, updates Constitution, By-Laws, and Guild Handbook.

Second Vice-President: Performs duties of either the President(s) or the Vice-President during absences, assists with updating of Constitution, By-Laws and Guild Handbook.

Secretary(s): Conducts correspondence, records minutes, and writes thank you letters on behalf of the Guild.

Treasurer(s): Prepares Guild budget, financial statements, accounts for audit, keeps Guild accounts and disburses funds

Past President(s): Prepares Nominations and presides over Elections.

COMMITTEES:

There are two kinds of Committees, Standing and Regular, and both types of Committees provide assistance to the Executive, and attend Executive meetings.

Standing Committees include: Membership, Program, Library, Newsletter. The chairmen of Standing Committees are elected for a period of one year and submit to the Treasurer, a proposed budget to be approved by the Executive.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE:

Collects dues, issues membership cards, records and compiles membership lists. This committee requires two members at the afternoon meeting and one or two at the evening meeting, with the exception of the September meeting when four or five assistants are required to collect dues and write out receipts. This committee works well run by a satellite group. The Guild has a Membership sign in/out Policy which must be followed. See page 15 of the Handbook.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE:

Arranges Guild Programs, workshops, mini demos, Tricks of the Trade and other events they choose to host, and related fees. The duties of this committee are fulfilled by three or four members at the afternoon meeting and two assistants at the evening meeting. Two understudies are desirable. Please check your current Newsletter for information and details regarding all upcoming events. Ideas may be submitted to the Program Committee.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE:

Librarian maintains assets, researches and purchases inventory, and tracks library inventory including items both borrowed and returned. Duty requires one librarian and many elves assisting at each meeting the Library is open.

NEWSLETTER COMMITTEE:

Prepares, produces, and distributes a monthly Newsletter September-June), sends membership e-mails and other notices when required. Duty requires one computer literate member plus assistants. This has worked very efficiently in the past with a satellite group.

REGULAR COMMITTEES:

Consist of non-elected volunteer positions held for one year. All positions are posted prior to the May Annual General Meeting, with Guild members applying for the positions enabling committee structure to remain in play



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until the end of the following Guild year in July. The committees operate only when members volunteer to take on the duties. The Executive may appoint members to serve in additional capacities, from time-to-time. Comprehensive job descriptions are available in the Guild Library.

REGULAR COMMITTEES, and a brief description of duties, include:

Block of the Month: Prepares block ideas with directions, and places them into monthly newsletters. (Usually one person in the afternoon and one person in the evening are sufficient.)

Boutique: Organizes sale of items, made by members, at craft fairs etc. when required. (Those selling items in the boutique work along with the Boutique chairman.)

Challenge: Prepares yearly "Challenge" for members. All experience levels are encouraged to participate. Creations are due at the April meeting and judged by members at the May meeting. In a 'Show' year, challenges are displayed during the Show, with winning ribbons attached. (Usually accomplished by one person)

Christmas Pot Luck: Plans the evening, food, table setting, and entertainment. (Three to five members required plus Executive members who assist after executive meeting.)

Coffee: Prepares refreshments at meetings. (Duty requires three to four members in the afternoon and one to two in the evening.)

Donation Quilts: Collects, distributes and records donation quilts. (Duty requires two members in the afternoon and one in the evening.

Fabric Exchange: Arranges participants into groups and ensures exchange bags are distributed. (Duty handled by one member.)

Historian(s): Keeps Guild history up-to-date, tracks records of membership, activities, events, and celebrations etc. (Works well with two members and two understudies.)

Hospitality: Prepares sign-in sheets, welcomes members/guests to meetings and events. (Two or three members in the afternoon and one or two in the evening works well)

June Picnic Pot Luck: Plans the day, displays food, arranges entertainment, theme and/or decorations. (Duty handled by three or four members, other attendees assist.)

Newsletter Advertising: Contacts advertisers, accepts payments. (Duty requires one member who can complete duties at home via computer.)

Nominations: This is the duty of the Past President(s). (Duty requires one member plus suggestions from others.)

Placemat: Collects donated placemats, records, and distributes as required. (Duty accomplished with two members in the afternoon and one or two in the evening.)

Publicity: Ensures Guild activities are in local papers, magazines, and on TV. (Duty accomplished by one member.)

Quilt Bee for Haven Society: Organizes yearly quilt bee. (Duty nicely accomplished with two members.)

Raffles: Sells tickets at meetings, obtains quilt related prizes from our newsletter advertisers. (Two members in the afternoon and two in the evening works well.)

Telephone: Contacts members in case of unforeseen circumstances.

(Duty requires one chairperson who prepares a phone chain system.)

Trips and Retreats: Organizes retreats and various Guild trips. (Duty accomplished by two members.)

Visiting Quilt Show: Provides small informal quilt shows for residents of seniors' facilities. (Usually three people travel as a group to display items.) **Web Liaison**: Liaison between Guild and Web Master supplying photos, articles, and other information as required. (Duty accomplished by one member.)

Peanut Butter Toffee Chocolate Chip

(Thanks to Caroll Rumo - these are great!!)

Oven: 350° makes 27 cookies		
1 ¼ C all-purpose flour	1/2 C brown sugar	
1/2 tsp baking soda	1/2 C white sugar	
1⁄4 tsp salt	1/2 C peanut butter	
1/2 C butter, at room temperature	1 egg	
1 C semi-sweet chocolate chips	1 tsp vanilla	
1/2 C toffee pieces – Skor pieces in baking section		

- 1. Stir together flour, soda and salt. Set aside.
- 2. Beat together butter and sugars until light and fluffy.

3. Beat in peanut butter until well blended.

- 4. Add egg and vanilla and beat again.
- 5. Stir in flour mixture until well combined.
- 6. Stir in chocolate chips and toffee pieces until well combined.
- 7. Drop by large tablespoons two inches apart onto lightly greased or parchment lined baking sheets.
- 8. Bake 8-10 minutes until cookies are a golden colour.
- 9. Transfer to a rack to cool.

I usually double the recipe. To double you will use the whole package of Skor pieces and 1 (350 gm) bag of chocolate chips. Cookies freeze well. Prepared cookie dough can also be wrapped well and frozen for a couple of months. Per cookie: 103 calories; 1.6 gm protein; 5.9 gm fat; 11.9 gm carbohydrates; 0.6 gm dietary fibre; 6 mg calcium; 0.4 mg iron; 4 mcg folacin.

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Rotary Blade Sharpening

George Kutcher offers mail order rotary blade sharpening. They will be as sharp as the original blade but at just a fraction of the cost. George has been professionally trained on the rotary blade sharpener at Wolf Industries factory in Spartanburg, South Carolina

The cost per blade (45 mm, 60 mm or 65 mm) is \$1.50. He will cover the cost of the return shipping on any orders over 50 blades.

For safety reasons, please ensure that all blades are secured in the plastic containers the blades come in. If it is necessary, tape them shut. Turnaround time, after receiving the blades, is between 7 and 10 days.

Please send a cheque or money order made out to:

Write your name or a number on the plastic containers to identify whose are whose. Note: These can hold eight to ten blades, so more than one person can use the same container. This will reduce the total volume and therefore, the shipping charges. Insure the package. (Up to \$100 costs about \$1.30) Please e-mail him **georgesharpening@gmail.com** with the shipping date and tracking info after shipment. Please make sure to put your name and return address **inside** the package for easy identification. **Useful Information**: In the long run it may be cheaper to buy a better blade (it stays sharp longer) than to buy a cheaper one and sharpen more often.

When not in use, store the blades, with a coat of oil ("3-IN-1" or light machine oil), in their plastic containers. Wipe carefully before using (remember they are very sharp).
