IMPORTANT: PLEASE READ

The following motion was presented re absentee voting:

Moved by Marg Bradley and seconded by Avril Valentine that the Guild accept the following Special Resolution and add it to our By-Laws

Whereas, Nanaimo Quilters' Guild members insist that the Guild stay current with the times;

Whereas, due to many members having the means and wherewithal to travel throughout the year;

Whereas each member in good standing is entitled to one vote;

Whereas, the Guild By-Laws, Section 4, Voting, ii) states "Voting by proxy is not permitted", where proxy votes allow an absent member to designate another member to vote for them;

Therefore, be it be resolved that Section 4, Voting, iii) be added to state that 'On a secret ballot, an absentee vote be permitted, said ballot to be published in the newsletter and the ballot to be returned via email or mail, with member name and membership number attached, to a designated appointee within a specific time frame, where an absentee is defined as a member who is unable to attend the meeting.

Since this motion would change our By-Laws, 30 day notice to members is required (which is given by publishing the motion in this newsletter). Discussion and voting on this motion will occur in September. A 75% majority is required to pass this motion as per our By-Laws.

Annelies Massey announced the winners for the Challenge.

Elections were next (see Barb Root's report), followed by Raffles and Show and Share.

The meeting was adjourned by the President, Norma Franks

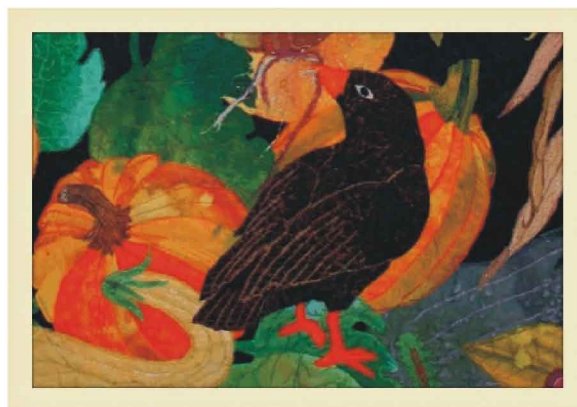

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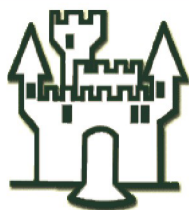


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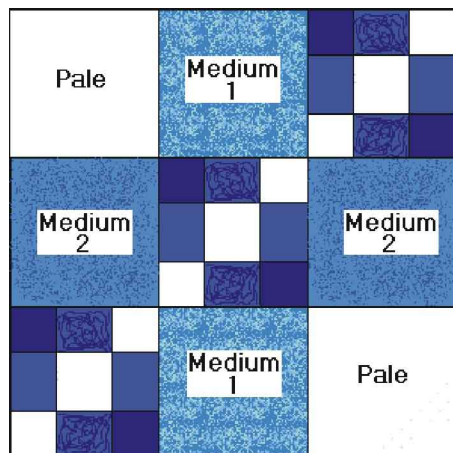
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September Block of the Month

Thanks to everyone who made the May blocks and congratulations to last month's winner, Judy McLaughlin. This year we're planning to include some colour theory along with the block of the month. To start we chose a monochromatic or single colour scheme to illustrate the use of colour value to create the design.

This month's block is a variation of Irish Chain. Remember, accuracy in cutting and piecing is important. All seams are $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Unfinished block is $12\frac{1}{2}$ " square.



Irish Chain

Fabric Choices:

First decide on your favourite colour, or the colour you have most of in your fabric stash. These are often the same thing. I used blue in the example, but choose any one of the 12 standard colour families of the colour wheel for yours.

For those of you who are new to colour theory, there are 3 primary colours: red, blue and yellow; three secondary: violet, green and orange and six tertiary ones intermediate to the other six: red-violet, blue-violet, blue-green, yellow-green, yellow-orange and red-orange. They are arranged like spokes around the colour wheel. Each of these 12 colours is called a colour family.

Here's a useful method to choose the fabrics to get the best contrast you could get from your stash. Lay out all the single-colour fabrics of your chosen colour, or about twenty, if you have a large stash. Be sure to try to cover a full range of values from palest pale to darkest dark. Try to increase visual interest by choosing tone on tone patterns to give more texture.

Arrange them according to value with a smooth transition from one value to the next. Set aside the palest (Pale) and the darkest (Darkest) fabrics. If you don't have any really pale or really dark values, white, grey or black can be used with any monochromatic scheme.

Now divide the array into 3 sections. You should have a light, a medium and a dark section. For this block choose the darkest pale (called for this block: Medium 1) and the lightest medium (Medium 2) and the darkest medium (Dark 2) and the lightest dark (Dark 3). Study your six fabrics and fine tune if needed.

Cutting:

- Pale** 2: $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ "
- Med 1** 2: $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ "
- Med 2** 2: $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ "

Strip Set A

- Pale** 1: $1\frac{3}{4}$ " x 12"
- Dark 2** 1: 2" x 12"
- Darkest** 1: $1\frac{3}{4}$ " x 12"

Strip Set B

- Pale** 1: 2" x 6"
- Dark 3** 2: $1\frac{3}{4}$ " x 6"

Construction:

First make the nine-patches.

For Set A, sew Pale to Dark 2 to Darkest, in that order. Press to centre. Cut into six $1\frac{3}{4}$ " units.

For Set B sew Pale between the 2 Dark 3's. Press away from Pale. Cut into three 2" units.

Lay out the nine-patches according to sketch below. Sew together, nesting the seams for sharp corners. Press away from centre.

Lay out block using the 9-patch units and the $4\frac{1}{2}$ " squares. Be sure to check that the pale squares in the nine-patch units form a diagonal across the block. Assemble and press.

Darkest	Dark 3	Pale

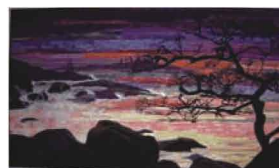

Thanks for the Sewing Machine Donations!

For the past two years members of this Guild have made donations of sewing machines to the Nanaimo Sewing School which has been established in Guyana, South America. On behalf of the Nanaimo Sewing School, I would like to express my sincere thanks to each and every one of you for your contribution in making the School such a success.

By August 2010 ninety machines were collected from all over Vancouver Island. The machines have since been serviced, carted and posted to Guyana.

The first School opened its doors in early November 2009, in New Amsterdam, a relatively small town with a population of about 35,000. The target group were young High School drop-outs; however, many housewives applied and were admitted. At the end of the 16 weeks course 17 students, all females, graduated.

The second School began in October 2010 in Corriverton, an even smaller town with a population of about 17,000. At the graduation ceremony in February 2011, each of the 12 graduates was given a sewing machine and the Canadian High Commissioner to Guyana said that this "gift of a sewing machine at graduation is a unique and powerful empowering process to women in the community".

As a young man in Guyana I was a professional tailor. After coming to Canada in 1966 I had a very good life, retiring recently from a successful career as a Professor of Anthropology at Vancouver Island University. In my retirement I am now returning to Guyana to teach sewing classes. I do this because I believe that these skills will keep young people off the streets and provide a solid opportunity to earn a livelihood. The essence of sustainability is getting local organizations involved so that they take on some ownership of the projects. In Guyana, local support for the 2009-2010 class came from Guyana Women in Development, a local Non-Governmental Organization (NGO). Support for the 2010-11 class came from the Rotary Club of Corriverton.

In teaching the sewing skills, the students focus on measuring, cutting and sewing school uniforms. The cloth is purchased locally and all the clothing sewn is in turn donated to the poorer children in the primary schools. In 2010 the School donated over 500 pieces of primary school uniforms. In 2011, the School donated 900 pieces of clothing to the children. It is truly amazing what they have accomplished and I am very proud of them.

What is next? Another 16 weeks of classes are planned for 2011-2012 and once again the Nanaimo Sewing School will open its doors on August 30, 2011, at Bush Lot, West Coast Berbice, Guyana.
